Claire will be leaving us to be the full-time Curate at the joint parish of Bush Hill Park in Enfield with the Revd Preb Dr Amatu Christian-Iwuagwu as her training incumbent. As Claire will still be living in New Southgate, I expect we will still see her about in Christ Church now and then.

July is then a month of expeditions. I will be leading the Tuscany Trip to the Puccini Festival – see Fr Paul if interested – and then the choir is off to the residency in Truro Cathedral for a week from the 24th. It is a lovely cathedral in a lovely setting. If you are planning a holiday anywhere near, do drop in and say hello. However you are enjoying your summer, I pray you will have a wonderful time of rest and refreshment – we've certainly packed it in this year so far!

Retreat to Iona

A few weeks ago, my husband Philip and I joined a group of fellow Christians on a retreat to Iona. I have long been fascinated by the island and its history, which can be traced back to Columba who arrived there in 563 AD with 13 followers and established a monastery.

This very small island off the west coast of Scotland has, for a long time, been on my list of

places to go to. The journey is a complicated one because to get there one has to travel through the island of Mull. This involves two separate ferries. We decided to leave the planning to Mc Cabe pilgrimages, and it was an excellent decision. The only planning we needed to do was to get ourselves to Glasgow.

Once settled in our lovely hotel, we were able to join in with as many of the planned activities we wanted, but we felt under no obligation to do so, if we just wanted to spend time in quiet reflection. I was glad that we joined the two excellent guided walks round the island.

The Abbey now has a thriving community of Christians, and we were able to join them in their daily worship at the beginning and end of the day. I couldn't help thinking how difficult it must be to have strangers joining an established community every day. I learnt a lot about Christian hospitality from the community who were based there.



We were also invited to a service of Holy Communion at the Scottish Episcopal chapel of the 'Bishops House' which we could see from our hotel window. This was originally a Victorian establishment and is now a diocesan retreat centre. The hospitality there was exemplary. The young woman I sat next to quietly helped me through the service book. She wasn't to know I was already familiar with it. Being interested in ecclesiastical embroidery I asked about theirs and was shown their beautiful Altar Frontal made by local people.

One of the highlights of the week was the trip to Fingal's caves, created 59 million years ago by volcanic activity. The day was pleasant one and the boat trip to the island of Staffa was over calm water. The climb from the boat to the caves was quite arduous but the experience when we got there was second to none. The atmosphere was astounding with the wild birds were all around us. We were all able to feel God's presence in God's natural Cathedral.

The Greatest Story Ever Told

But how could you live and have no story to tell?" asks Dostoyevsky to which we can respond with a simple answer: "We do have a story. We are part of the greatest story ever told".

Before the Big Bang 13.8 billion years ago, before the creation of the celestial world, the Being that existed, was uncreated. Scripture tells us that this uncreated Being (o Ωv as is labelled on Greek icons), is the timeless relationship between the persons of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. God is a communion being.

Scripture also tells us that our world was created for a purpose (a logos) and that the logos is to enable human beings to be partakers in God's uncreated energies. This is referred to as theosis (from the Greek word for God Theos) otherwise referred to as deification.

Our purpose appears to be to turn from created beings, to real beings like God. To do this, we need to become communion beings, sharing our existence with humanity and God. Our tendency to treat others as 'other', therefore, is anathema to our path of salvation.

The story becomes even more interesting when I ask why do I need to become a partaker in the divine and how can this possibly happen?

My understanding of the 'why' is that if we believe in the immortality of the soul, we also need to accept that creation has made us captive to our humanity. Not even suicide gives us an escape route. In view of this, whether our creation is a gift, or a curse is questionable. Immortality could soon become a curse unless the purpose for our creation is to give us the possibility of escape into a different type of existence: the possibility of being as communion in the fulness of love and absolute freedom

assured by the infinity of God. Theosis promises us the beatific vision: to see God as He is. To be able to do this, we have to be released from this existence.

As to 'how', we have been given the Church. The Church is a body more perfect than the world. The Church is founded on the work of Christ and the work of the Holy Spirit, the two persons of the Trinity sent into the world so that we may attain union with God. Christ is the head of the Church, and the Church is his body (Eph 1:22). The Holy Spirit quickens the Church and fills her with divinity (Eph 1:23). The Godhead dwells within her as it dwelt in the deified humanity of Christ.

The entry and departure of Christ in the history of the world are the Incarnation and Ascension, and the entry of the Holy Spirit in the history of the Church is Pentecost, which will end with the second coming. Pentecost is not a continuation of the incarnation but the result of the incarnation. By the death on the cross, the Church has been redeemed, washed and purified by the blood of Christ so that it is fit to receive the Holy Spirit, appearing as tongues of fire at Pentecost, just as it appeared as a dove during the baptism and chrismation of Jesus.

Salvation, therefore, is only possible through the Church. It is by becoming one body with the rest of humanity, past, present and

future, that we can access the bridge created for us by Christ and the Holy Spirit to unite us with God. It is a body made up of individuals who are not lost in and subdued by the body, but remain individuals each receiving the Holy



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Spirit as a tongue of fire, uniting us into one body headed by the Son.

Much has been made of the story of Jesus's birth, death and resurrection. Little is said of the sequel: the story of the Church - our story; the story of creation of saints, so that we can become a communion of saints: people who are not just good but holy and the only way to holiness is Christ who is "the way and the truth and the life" (John 14:6).

'Come Holy Ghost' New English Hymnal No.138

This is a very ancient hymn known by its Latin title as 'Veni Creator Spiritus', and as well as being sung at Pentecost, it is also sung at Confirmations, Ordinations and the Consecration of Bishops. It was sung, of course, very recently at King Charles' Coronation. The version we sing is a translation of the Latin by John Cosin, who was the Bishop of Durham in the 17th Century after the Restoration of the Monarchy in 1660.

The hymn is thought to have been written by Rabanus Maurus in the 9th Century, who was a Frankish Benedictine monk who was Archbishop of Mainz in Germany and a theologian. It seems to have been used widely in the church ever since. I expect we will sing it at Pentecost.

The hymn starts with an invocation to the

Holy Spirit to be with us all or with those about to be Confirmed, Ordained or Consecrated. The second line 'lighten with celestial fire' refers to the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the Disciples at Pentecost in the form of tongues of fire. The verse goes on to ask the Holy Spirit for his sevenfold gifts.

This originates from Chapter 11 of the book of Isaiah which is a prophesy of the coming of the Messiah 'A shoot will come out of the stump of Jesse'. Isaiah lists six gifts of the Spirit to which the church added a seventh. The enumeration of the gifts was probably by St. Thomas Aquinas. The gifts mentioned by Isaiah are Wisdom, Understanding, Counsel (Right judgement), Fortitude, Knowledge and Fear of the Lord. To these the church added Piety. These are certainly gifts for which we need to pray.

The second verse asks the Holy Spirit to give us his 'comfort, life and fire of love'. This refers to the Spirit sometimes being called the 'Comforter'. The name for the Spirit 'the Paraclete' can be translated as 'Comforter' as well as 'Advocate'. The prayer for life and fire of love links with him being known as the Lord of Life and Love. And we also ask for his vision to restore our 'blinded sight'.

The third verse of the hymn asks for the protection of the Holy Spirit from the sins which will always attack us - 'our soiled face' and also from external foes.

The hymn ends in a doxology with emphasis on the unity of the Trinity and praying that we may know that in our hearts.

It's interesting to note that, although this hymn is well over a thousand years old and has been used throughout that time, it is so relevant to our present needs.

God - the Three in One

This month we celebrate Trinity Sunday. The doctrine of the Trinity is one of the most important of the Christian faith, for it goes to the very heart of what God is like. The Bible is guite clear: there is one God, but He is revealed in three 'persons' - the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

Have you ever wondered at what point in the Bible God is revealed as being more than one person? Well, you don't have to read very far:

only to Genesis 1:26, where God (Elohim - a plural noun) says: Let US make man in OUR image. (Gen. 1:26)

The Bible reveals a pattern: God the Father lives in heaven and has never been seen. God the Son became the incarnate Jesus Christ, who made known to us the Father, and God the Holy Spirit, who is unseen, has been sent to live within and to equip His people, the Church.

The Trinity is basic to our salvation – for these three persons in the one Godhead have combined to save us from our sins: it is the WILL of the Father, the saving WORK of the Son, and the indwelling WITNESS of the Holy Spirit. (John 14:16, 23-26). From Parish Pump

St. Alban: Feast Day 22nd June

St. Alban, and his cathedral, will be familiar to most of us (especially the choir!) but it's always worth commemorating our earliest martyr, who is also the patron saint



of converts, refugees and torture victims. The story of St. Alban reflects his courage, faith, and willingness to sacrifice his life for his beliefs.

St. Alban lived during the 3rd century in the Roman city of Verulamium, present-day St. Albans. According to accounts, he was a pagan who encountered a Christian priest fleeing from persecution. Impressed by the priest's devotion, Alban offered him refuge in his home. During their time together, Alban became intrigued by the Christian faith and soon converted to Christianity himself.

News of Alban's conversion reached the Roman authorities, who were actively persecuting Christians at the time. In order to protect the priest, Alban exchanged clothes with him, allowing the priest to escape. When the Roman soldiers arrived at Alban's home, they mistook him for the priest and arrested him instead.

Alban was brought before the Roman magistrate and was given an opportunity to renounce his newfound faith and embrace Roman paganism. However, he boldly refused to deny his Christian beliefs, declaring his allegiance to Christ. The magistrate, outraged by his defiance, sentenced Alban to death.

Music for the Summer Term

This Summer, we have a full programme of musical events keeping us busy. Fresh from the celebrations of the Coronation and Ascensiontide, the Choir (at the time of writing) is now preparing repertoire for the Sundays after Trinity, where the lectionary focuses on Jesus' ministry and teachings.


On Trinity Sunday (4 June), the Choir will sing the wonderfully jubilant *Messe Solennelle in C sharp minor* by the French composer Louis Vierne (1870-1937) who was organist of Notre-Dame in Paris from 1900 until his death. At Evensong, the Choir will also perform the dramatic anthem *I Saw the Lord* by the late Victorian composer Sir John Stainer (1840-1901) was Organist of St Paul's Cathedral. Stainer is most well known for his Passiontide cantata *The Crucifixion*.

On Sunday 11 June we shall marking the RSCM Sunday when Church Choir's across the country will celebrate musicmaking in Church. Liturgically this day is the Feast of St Barnabas the Apostle. Suitably large-scale music will be heard at both services, but the grandest music of the day can be heard at Evensong. The Choir will be singing Herbert Howells' Gloucester Evening Service and Sir Edward Elgar's *The Spirit of the Lord* which sets text from Isaiah 61. This anthem is taking from his larger oratorio *The Apostles*.

A popular and well-loved Parish fixture is of course the Choir's informal Summer Concert which will be on Sunday 9 July at 4pm. Our highly talented members of the Choir will present both solo and ensemble performances, including some barbershop, madrigals and partsongs, as well as some more contemporary music. There should a lively mixed of vocal and instrumental music and is surely an event not to be missed.

To round off the term, the Choir will be embarking on a week-long residency at Truro Cathedral from Wednesday 26 – Sunday 30

July. The Choir will be singing every day under the direction of myself, while Kate will be playing the Cathedral Organ. When the Choir is off duty, we



shall be staying at a local boarding school and taking the opportunity to enjoy the amazing county of Cornwall. Daily excursions are planned to Land's End, St Michael's Mount, Falmouth, and St Agnes, giving us the opportunity to explore both the north and south Cornish coast. I dare say we shall have our fair share of the famous cream teas and pasties as well as the enjoy the wonderful seafood for which the county is so well know.

A visit to the Go-Karts will be on the agenda as well as enjoying the beautiful beaches, and coastal walks.

What is Trinity Sunday?

Trinity Sunday this year is on 4th June and is a special day when we celebrate and try to understand the idea of the Holy Trinity. The Holy Trinity is the belief that there is one God, but He exists in three persons: God the Father, God the Son (Jesus), and God the Holy Spirit.

The Trinity is like an egg. Just as ONE egg has THREE different parts – the shell, the white, the yoke – ONE God has THREE different Persons – Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

God the Father is the creator and the one who made everything. He is a loving parent who takes care of us and watches over us.

God the Son, Jesus, came to Earth a long time ago to teach us about love, kindness, and forgiveness. Jesus is also called the Saviour because He sacrificed Himself for us and showed us how much God loves us.

Christchurch Association News

The Christchurch Association (CCA) provides a social centre for the parish and runs the "Top Step Bar", serving soft and alcoholic drinks upstairs in Church House. We are now able to take contactless payments as well as accepting cash.



The CCA Top Step bar opens early **at 6 pm** normally on the first Friday of each month, with complimentary **cheese and snacks** available through the evening. The next such occasions are **Fridays 2nd June** and **7th July.**

In April we enjoyed an informative Top Step Talk given by the Hatters ESU Explorer Scouts about their forthcoming expedition to the Himalayas. The CCA donated £150 to assist with their fundraising for their trip, and we are making similar donations to the Christ Church Choir Fund and Organ Fund.

News from the Committees



The Parochial Church Council (the PCC)

met on 25th April, so much of this news may already be common knowledge.

In the run up to the coronation, the most notable **Outreach** activity at Christ Church was, perhaps, the choir's international media debut in Germany and France! (They were filmed rehearsing the new coronation anthem composed by Joanna Forbes L'Estrange.) On a more local level, activities included the Walker School service and another round of ABRSM music exams. However, in his report to the PCC, Fr Chrichton also mentioned our social media presence over the Easter period – and I quote – "... which courtesy of a C of E retweet gave us about 30,000 views across different platforms".

The **Finance & Standing** report showed little overall change since the previous meeting (a small surplus in day-to-day expenditure and a modest overall deficit). The treasurer also noted, however, that bills for the chancel floor are now starting to come (professional fees, etc.) and that this explains the deficit.

Good news was received from **Plant & Fabric!** The chancel floor work is now out to tender. The intention is still to begin work this summer and complete before Christmas. Discussion also took place regarding disabled toilet provision at Christ Church. This has been on the "to do" list now for many years. It was agreed that given the upcoming expenditure on repairing and making safe the chancel floor, steps would be taken to make the most of the toilet provisions that already exist; Christ Church is not at present in a position to undertake additional costly building work. It was also confirmed that the process of installing a plaque to identify the Queen's acer is under way.

Social Responsibility this time reported excellent sales of Easter cards and gifts from the stall and a very successful Easter egg collection for the Ark – the committee's activities are as always described in full elsewhere in this magazine.

Eco & Care Creation reported the great success of the Maundy Thursday children's garden activity – the results were visible for all to see on the window sills over Easter. A wonderful time seems to have been had by all concerned. We also heard about the latest rockery project and that the new bees were arriving imminently. As ever, more gardeners and more ideas are needed – Sandra Anderson was very keen to encourage volunteers.

Parish Centre Management reported a programme of safety upgrades now under way at the Parish Centre, following points raised in the Fire Risk Assessment conducted last February by Chubb.

The Electoral Roll



Thank you to everyone who has recently participated in the annual review of the Christ Church Southgate Electoral Roll.

The good news is that with the addition of a number of new names, our Electoral Roll has crept up by a total of six, from 227 last year for 233 now! Given the number of people who have left Southgate during the year and have asked to be removed from the roll, this is very good news indeed – the picture initially was looking rather bleak. So first and foremost, welcome and a very big thank you Christ Church Southgate

to all those who have completed application forms during the year and during the recent review period.

During the review this year, I've also received a few questions about the Electoral Roll and the purpose it serves, including the following:

Q Will it cost me anything?

A No. Not a penny. And it no longer costs Christ Church anything either! A lot of people remember the days when the more people a church had on the Roll, the more it ended up paying to the Diocese. But that no longer happens. (The money churches pay to their respective dioceses is calculated quite differently these days.)

Q What's the point of the Electoral Roll?

A This is the big question, because I know that on one level it can appear to have very little point at all. First and foremost, however, it identifies everyone who is able stand for office and/or to vote in elections at the Annual General Parochial Meeting - we may need to vote for Church Wardens, PCC members, representatives at the Diocesan Synod, etc. But it can also help in other ways: it helps in our parish to have some clear idea of how many regular worshippers come through the door - for example, Fr Chrichton would be able to refer to this number if he needed to ask the Diocese for extra help with the workload, or knowing the number might help in arguments when applying for grants or funding for projects, etc.; it helps our Diocese to see how numbers are holding up in the churches for which they have responsibility - essential when matters of closing or grouping churches arise; and it helps the Church more widely to know just how many practicing Christians there are in the UK (the Office for National Statistics recorded just over 42% of the population in the 2021 census).

- Q If I hand over my details, who gets to see them? I don't want them spreading around.
- A Your application form is strictly confidential. The hard copy is kept securely by the Electoral Roll Officer and shredded if you ask to be removed from the roll or at the end of the six-year period of the roll. The electronic copy is password protected and is available only to the Electoral Roll Officer, the Vicar, the Church Wardens, and the Stewardship Officer. Your personal details are really as safe as we can make them.

So, being on the roll is not essential, but it is helpful. You can complete an application form (available online and as hard copy at the back of church) at any time. If you have not already completed a form and would still like to do so, you can email it to me as an attachment, leave it with one of the Church Wardens or a member of the clergy, or put it in an envelope addressed to me in the mail rack at the back of church. You can do this at any time.

We try to be a friendly, welcoming, caring, and inclusive church; and speaking as the Electoral Roll Officer, I would personally love to feel that every member of the congregation feels that they really do belong here. If you have any questions, do please ask me.

We held a Coronation raffle, after the wonderful Sunday service, which was drawn by the King!! at the picnic lunch. All three prizes were claimed on the day, and we raised £170. As a result, we will send £200 to the **Explorer Scouts** for their summer expedition to the Himalayas. A large group of them are going, taking prescription glasses to help people with sight problems.

Christian Aid week was in the middle of May. Donations were collected in the usual envelopes in cash or by cheque. Donations direct to Christian Aid at **caweek.org** - this is the best way to add gift aid.

Thank you to all the generous people who regularly give us the things we ask for. Each contribution gives other members and visitors their chance to help boost our fundraising efforts. For example, recently I was brought 8 pounds of blackberries. With the jars I have been given and a donation for sugar I was able to make blackberry jelly. These jars sell for $\pounds1.50$ which is all profit. Hand-made cards are another money spinner.

Stewardship

In the months since I wrote my last article, I am sorry to report that for various reasons we have recently lost some of the longest standing members of our Stewardship Scheme. So, I am starting this report with a plea for anyone that attends Christ Church not in stewardship to consider making their contribution regularly to Christ Church by signing up for our preferred donation method, the Parish Giving Scheme (PGS), details of how you can do this are in the HOW YOU CAN HELP box at the end of this article.

If you need any further information as to how the PGS works and to help you make your decision I am always happy to explain this in detail and discuss the options available, my contact details are set out below.

Membership of the PGS costs you nothing, and also there is no cost to us. The other excellent part of the scheme is an additional feature whereby your donation can be automatically increased annually in line with inflation. This is something we recommend as this helps to offset the ever-increasing costs we face. At present just over half of our donors have agreed for this, it is a flexible arrangement that can be taken-up or cancelled at any time to suit your circumstances.

Donations via the contactless machine or online via our website also continue to increase and the blue Gift Aid envelopes from the pews are also being used more often. However, as stated before all these other methods have a cost to us. Either by a charge made by the provider of online giving or in the case of cash and cheques by our bank. Cash attracts a charge of $\pounds1.50$ per $\pounds100$ and each cheque we pay in costs us $\pounds1.50$, irrespective of the amount.



- The youth group will be presenting Shakespeare's Hamlet in the church hall this Friday at 7pm. The congregation is warmly invited to attend this tragedy.




